Farewell Sequoia By: Roberta McCardle

It is with much sadness that I share with you that we lost our beloved Sequoia on Sunday, January 19th. He had not been feeling well for awhile and Joanie had the vet out to check on him the week before he died. We were watching him closely as per the vet's instructions. He passed gently in the barn during the night. We will all long remember what a thoroughly nice horse he was. I heard someone describe him as a gentleman and that was so appropriate. Sequoia was getting on in years and had been around awhile (hence, his name). He was calm, mature, and unflappable. Many of us felt so comfortable around him. He had arthritis and frequently would be the last horse to come in to the barn for the evening feed. Sometimes you would have to go out and get him, letting him take his time and set the pace. We were able to give him some regained health & weight and a peaceful life for his final years. This is what we need to remember and be grateful for.....Vaya con Dios, Sequoia. (I like to think of him now as being free of arthritis and able to romp and run).

News From The Herd

Sun Dance had four visits from the veterinarian this month. It started with what seemed like Uvietus or Moon Blindness along with low-level colic. South Ridge has a very nice new vet, Dr. Amy Betka, who worked with us to figure out the many symptoms Sun Dance was displaying. Eye problems that looked like uvietus, colic acting, dangerous mood, lack of interest in feed, and loss of weight. The blood test reviled that 75% of her liver was damaged. This led us to the ammonia that was present in her blood stream. Upon further investigation as to the cause, a pretty little yellow flowering plant called Ragwort was the likely culprit. This is common in most fields, and it is generally believed that horses will not eat it. During the growing season horses don't usual touch it. But once it dies back in the fall it becomes palatable to the animals. The damage is cumulative over the years of exposure until there is only 25% of the liver working. Then the symptoms will appear. Sun Dance has gone through a treatment to take the am-

monia out of her blood; a special diet will be needed for the rest of her life (which includes Milk thistle and Tagement). Her last blood test showed remarkable improvement. The prognosis is much better for our 38-year-old girl, than it was before her progressive treatment.

For all of the cold, snowy, rainy weather the horses are doing great. Thank you for making their treatments possible.

Tax Time AGAIN!

Well it is that time of the year once again to give the government what they think is their share of your money. Your Tax Donation Letters are in the mail to all of the kind folks who have kept the horses fed and cared for this past year. If for some reason you do not get your letter or there was a mistake, please feel free to contact HPS, and we will see that you get the information you need for your tax return. We were working with a new accounting program this year that turned out to be a nightmare when we tried to merge the information for the letters.

For the kind folks who have lent a hand at the sanctuary this year, remember to take the mileage cost off your tax return. (For some this could add up to a substantial amount.) I believe that last year the amount was \$.145 per mile. For the new members, it is definitely worth keeping track of your visits to the ranch. Anytime you donate an item to the ranch, just keep the receipt for tax time next year. It is impossible to keep track of every item that is dropped off at the ranch for the horses. Remember the yard sale items are also tax deductible. Some folks make a list of the items they drop off, and one of us signs it for their records. We are collecting items already for this spring's sale. First weekend in May is the proposed date.

An interesting point that came up when we were preparing the Tax Letters. In 2001 we had right at 200 letters to mail out. That was very few people to support so many horses..... It was an extremely difficult year for HPS! This year (2002) we had a little more than twice that number of letters to mail out. We still did not reach budget for most of the months during the year, and it was often a juggling act to keep going. But the last half of the year we could breath a little easier. We pray for each person's continuing support to keep the sanctuary open and viable. May God bless you, and the horses thank you for their lives.
