Gold Rush Returns

The beautiful palomino Gold Rush has spent the last few years in a wonderful home. However, Gold Rush originally came to HPS from an abuse case in Anson County. While the case went to trial Gold Rush was kept in the county. The judge ordered that Gold Rush be given to the Horse Protection Society. The person who was caring for Gold Rush, while the case was waiting to be heard in Anson County would not listen to the instructions for re-feeding the starved Gold Rush. He gave her gallons of sweet feed everyday. This may have caused her present weight problems. Gold Rush arrived at the sanctuary quite overweight. She was immediately put on a diet, which did not seem to do much good since the horses have free feed of hay.

It was not difficult to place such a beautiful horse. The family had a small property and it was easier to control her grass and hay intake. Her new people even used a grazing muzzle, but Gold Rush ate through three of them. There were several times the vet had to be called because of the fear she was going into laminitis. She was put on a special feed and thyroid medication all to no avail. The family sold their home and moved to a new country property with lush pastures. Their concern was for Gold Rush and the difficulty it now presented to keep her from foundering. After much thought and with much heartbreak, they felt she would be safer being returned to HPS.

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Did You Know?

Mud is good!

Walking your horse through mud is actually good for him. Mud helps to moisturize and seal the hoof. Without moisture, the hoof will dry out and crack causing considerable pain for the horse and possibly making him go lame. Water alone is not always enough to prevent hoof dryness. Another way to moisturize a horse's hoof is to use one of the commercial hoof moisturizer products.

Justice Is Free

Justice's court date was April 11th. It was a rainy day and I left a little after 7AM to make sure I arrived on time for court. I arrived about 8:30 and of course, I had to go through the metal detectors and make sure I was at the right courtroom. The officer from Animal Control arrived and reviewed the case. I had the needed pictures of when Justice first arrived and a picture of what he looks like now. I also had the vet's report and the vet bill along with a history time line of everything we had to do for Justice to save his life.



Waiting in the court is always stressful. Susan Klutz was present with an attorney. Her attorney was interested in settling the case, so after an agreement was made with the district attorney, who owns horses, a plea of "No contest" was entered. Klutz cannot own another horse until she goes through the R.E.I.N.'s course. She did not have the funds to pay the costs charged by the court, so she has to make payments. But the very best and most important news is that Justice was awarded to HPS.

After court, Klutz came up to me to say that she knew several people who were interested in getting Justice. I told her they could watch Petfinders for when he is available and that they would have to put in an application.

Justice will need months and months of rehab before he is ready for a new home. We never rush this process. She wanted the pictures of what he first looked like when he was taken and what he looks like now, so I gave them to her. She had owned Justice for seven years. She said he is a cross between a draft and Quarter horse, but I don't think that this correct. He did not get any of the characteristics of a draft except for the Roman nose. Klutz told me he once weighed 1,500 pounds... once again, I don't think so! He does not have the body structure to carry that much weight.

Justice has gained over 450 pounds since he came to the sanctuary. He is proving to be quite the character! Come meet this friendly, funny guy and watch his continuing recovery. Please become an Angel sponsor of Justice.

The rest of us had to pick ourselves up off the ground from laughing so hard. Each person was met with the same reaction from Gold Rush as they presented their chosen names.

Chase Torrence, then six years old, had suggested the name "Gold Rush" the day before. I told him we had other better names. We had run out of ideas for a new name, so I stepped forward and asked her if she liked the name "Gold Rush." She posed as if in a show ring: head up, ears forward and looking straight into my eyes. We had been laughing so hard our faces hurt and once again, everyone cracked up laughing. Erika Torrence stepped forward and said to the horse, "Now, we want to make sure this is the name you really want. Are you sure, you want the name "Gold Rush?" Gold Rush gave a huge nod, "Yes." She was asked once more with the same result.

Chase was dragging a stick, walking around the round pen, and talking as he moved along, "I told Joanie Gold Rush was a good name. I thought she would like the name Gold Rush. Gold Rush was my favorite name." He was unaware Gold Rush was quietly walking behind him, with her head down following him. She has answered to her name since that day.
